coma, and underwent numerous surgeries and multiple blood transfusions.

While he was bravely fighting the battle, my husband, Don, a dentist with his own practice in Northfield, would use magic to distract Chad from the fear and pain he was enduring. While receiving his treatments, Chad would lie in his hospital bed and practice making magic for hours a day. Each week, his dad would teach him new tricks to master. In 1998, at long last, Chad was released from the hospital. That same year Don collapsed and was subsequently diagnosed with a malignant brain tumor and died on January 17, 2000, leaving behind me and our children, Faith and Chad.

In January 2003, Chad began experiencing severe headaches. Doctors determined that Chad was bleeding from the brain and he underwent emergency brain surgery. When Chad awoke from his surgery deficit free he decided to make his father's dying wish his living wish. That wish was for "Chad to be considered cured and continue to spread the magic". Therefore this nonprofit charitable 501(c)(3) foundation was formed and is being dedicated to the memory and wishes of Chad's dad, Dr. Donald Juros (1958-2000).

Our Spread the Magic Foundation's mission is to entertain patients and their families with live magic shows.

Chad's Story . . .

I've had the pleasure and pain of being the mother of a two time cancer survivor and the widow of a brain cancer victim. In 1991, at the age of three, my son, Chad, was diagnosed with leukemia. In 1995, at the age of seven, he relapsed. For 17 months Chad and I lived as an inpatient in the cancer ward of Children's Hospital of Philadelphia. There, Chad fought the good fight, which included having to learn how to walk and talk again because of the devastating side effects of the drugs that were intended to cure him. Tubes were attached to him so he could breathe and eat. Through the ordeal, he experienced cardiac arrest and

In addition, we fund services for the survivorship program at Children's Hospital of Philadelphia.

Chad is cured from his cancer and is a full time college student plus a full time professional magician who spreads his magic touch around the world. He has performed at the White House numerous times, was featured on Criss Angel's Mindbreak for the A&E network, on the show Dinner Impossible for the Food Network, and is the official magician to the Philadelphia 76ers and Philadelphia Flyers, and much more. Chad is the recipient of the Courage and Inspiration Award by the American Cancer Society and the Volunteer of the Year Award from the Lymphoma and Leukemia Society.
